## Launch & Haul Best Practices

Quick Tips:

- Bow & Stern Lines securely fastened and coiled at ground level
- Strap location marks on port & starboard side
- Mark keel placement on cradle
- Check trailer tires
- Check through hull and sensors
- Paint behind cradle pads
- Bring a friend
- Get to the wharf early

*( By following these simple and courteous practices you will avoid being beaned off the head by the large water balloon cannon Greg is building on the Club lawn-or so he promises ! )*

## **RYC Berths and Docks**

I would like to welcome everyone back on the docks this year. Most of you have responded to my earlier email and that has been very helpful. Only one small powerboat is not returning this year. There is a waiting list for both power and sail that will keep the docks fully utilized. However, there are no new spots for sailboats as yet. We have an idea or two that may make the space utilization more efficient but I cannot make any plans based on that as yet.

The upgrade plans for this year include additional power outlets, both shore power plugs and conventional 3-prong plugs. This includes one at the end of each T-dock for occasional use by people not on the docks. We have applied for a grant to replace the pump out system but have not heard back on that as yet. We should hear about that very soon. Clear instructions as to the pump out's use will be posted in a weatherproof form to improve its use and compliance. An additional float on the dinghy dock will reduce some of the congestion. At some point the red boxes on "A" and "B" docks will be replaced to allow for more plugs and safety.

We will need help launching the docks and fitting them out. The time and dates will be distributed once we have decided when to proceed. We had a good turnout last year and that allowed the job to be completed in one day, a first I heard.

This section includes the reminders for the use of the docks. Unfortunately it contains several items that may not be very popular but we need to keep them in mind.

**1-**Boats may not be left on the docks overnight unless they are in designated slips. There were many nights when this occurred last year and it is not a practice that can continue. There may be the rare night when leaving a boat on a dock is necessary. If someone feels that to be the case, please make arrangements with John Boyd. If he is not available please contact me, the commodore or vice-commodore.

**2-**Use of power overnight necessitates the payment of the power fee (\$75). The fee is to support the infrastructure, not necessarily the power consumption.

**3-**Until the breakwater is in place, whenever that might or might not be, the boats must be removed from the docks when the forecasted winds are expected to exceed 40km/h, 25mph or 20 knots from the southwest. We all detest this but it is necessary to protect the docks, other boats and minimize the risk to people on the docks. If you expect to be unable to comply with this because of being out of town for instance, please remove your boat before you leave. RYC staff will not be moving boats without the owner or designate on board. Each boat must have a mooring or be readily removed by trailer. This is a condition of being a member as agreed to by each of us on signing the application form.

**4-**The gate to the docks will be locked by the staff as they leave each night. The position of the gate may be further away from the shore to enhance its effectiveness. Dinghies may not be tied up on the dock between the shore and the gate. As of this Jib Sheet, the same key will be used this year.

## From the Harbour

Spring has sprung by the looks of things, and it will not be long before we can get on the boats again. Just a couple of reminders to make sure your boating season remains positive.

Spend a little time on your mooring ball before you install it this spring. There have been failures in the mooring gear over the last few years, some could have been prevented with a good visual inspection.

Some of the things to check for are:

Make sure the number is clearly visible

If you have not changed out your swivel in the last few years, **NOW** is the time. We are recommending ¾" swivels as replacements.

Shackle pins should be secured.

Mooring ropes checked for signs of chaffing.

Top chain wear.

There will be a supply of rope, shackles, swivels, and chain available at the club again this year. If you are not sure what you need, see myself or John Boyd for assistance.

This years mooring inspection will be completed in July and August. We are looking to inspect the remainder of the moorings that were not looked at in the last two years. If you have a concern regarding your mooring, let us know, and we will do our best to make any improvements required.

Heave to-Newcomers quite often find themselves heaving too

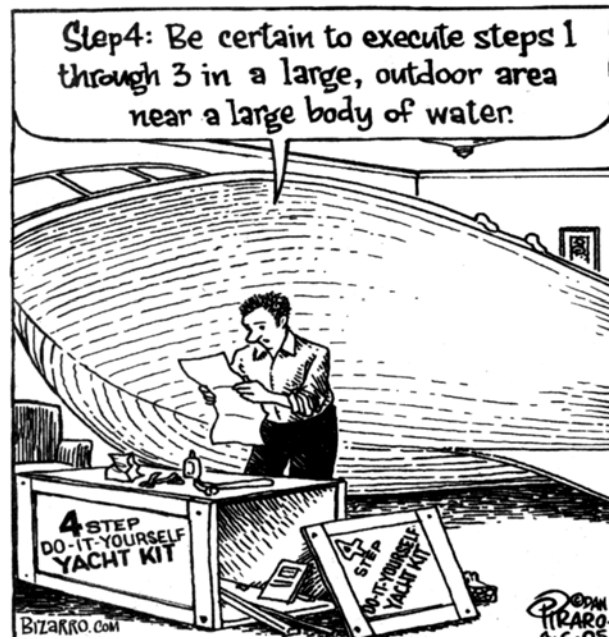
Pop the Chute-The sound a Poly Chute makes just as it blows apart (see America One)
